
Steamers, complete with fireworks, surpassed last year's donations.

After graduating from Johnson and Wales in 1998, Andy and Karin stayed on at the school for another year as teaching assistants. They were engaged in May of 1999 and decided to make Elizabeth City their home. With big plans of opening their own restaurant in Elizabeth City, they decided to get married first. OBX Room In the Inn

Due to generous grants and donations, The OBX Room In the Inn provided **1,643** safe room nights, served **4,935 meals**, and helped

6 people secure permanent housing. This season's impact is a testament to the power of community, compassion, and a shared belief that everyone deserves a place to call home.



The Albemarle Alliance for Children and Families assisted over 200 families, providing vision screening, car seats, childcare assistance, and parenting/referral programs.

Albemarle Hopeline presented the "Safe Dates" program in **3 schools** with **over 200 participants.** This program reduced teen dating violence and future exploitation through domestic or sexual violence.

The American Red Cross responded to 59 disasters, helping 72 families, 180 individuals, and providing over \$53,500 in support to local communities.

Bertie County 4-H is building the next generation of leaders. Donations funded camp scholarships, equipped youth with skills for success, and provided supplies for after school programs for **more than 200 children**.

"Camp Happy," run by the **Bertie County YMCA**, gave **200 children** a fun and safe place to spend the summer where they enjoyed two meals each day and furthered their academic skills.

SOULS Ministry

"Hunger Hides in Plain Sight – Hope Doesn't Have To"
SOULS Ministry has been providing a meal every evening, 365 days a year,
for 17 years. SOULS is staffed by over 300 volunteers and serves over
10,000 meals each year for those who enter its door. As a gateway for
those in need, SOULS not only provided meals, but assisted in connecting
individuals with community resources based on their needs.



Boys and Girls Club of the Albemarle (Elizabeth City & Edenton campuses) provided camp scholarships to **230 children** including two daily meals, field trips, and STEM and other education programs.

Carolina Rebuilding Ministry in Windsor assisted **88 low-income homeowners** with repairs for weather-related issues, indoor plumbing, heating systems, roofs, windows, and installation of safe flooring.

Children's Hospital of The King's Daughters delivered a host of medical and mental health services to **over 183,478 children**. The United Way gift funded desperately needed translation services.

Chowan County 4-H served **500 children. Three** attended the NC 4-H Congress at NC State and **several campers** received scholarships to attend Foodie Friends Cooking Class.

33 Partner Agencies Touching Thousands of Lives

Chowan County Smart Start summer program hosted **21 children** in its daily Jump Start "camp" to prepare them for kindergarten, thereby ensuring that all children have a bright beginning. Prenatal and parenting classes were also provided to families.

The Community Care Clinic of Dare formed a grassroots response to the needs of the under/uninsured in the community by providing medical, dental, mental health, and pharmacy services. In a recent ninemonth period, it provided systematic oral health exams and dental treatment to **1,235 individuals**.

Currituck Kids provided camp scholarships, free school supplies, essential medical care such as dental and vision screening, and addressed other one-time needs for **over 3,000 local children**.

The Place of Possibilities

"Where Barriers Fall and Futures Rise"

The Place of Possibilities – led by Dr. Laura Early – empowered **over 500 children and strengthened families of at-risk youth through transformative support.** Through a United Way grant, **60 children** experienced the joy of summer camp. The Place of Possibilities' ten-cent thrift store, food bank partnership, and senior classes reached **hundreds more individuals**,



meeting critical needs with compassion and dignity. Its "Holy Cow" van also traveled to provide food, clothing, medical supplies, and spiritual support to the community.

A wish-granting program, **Dream Hunt and Fishing**, provided children who have critical illnesses and disabilities, children of fallen first responders, and "at risk" youth who are interested in hunting, fishing, or exploring the great outdoors a chance to fulfill their dreams. It also provided educational camps and classes to numerous youth from local schools, with **more than 25,000 lives touched** last year.

Elizabeth City Habitat for Humanity built **one complete home** for a family and helped **nine low-income senior homeowners** with repairs they could not afford on their own.

Food Bank of the Albemarle provided **over 80,000 individuals** with healthy food, thereby increasing access to those who experience food insecurity in the area.

Gates County 4-H provided hands-on, youth-led learning experiences that empowered young people to become confident, capable leaders in their communities. Through in-school, after-school, and community-based programming, 4-H offered education opportunities in STEM, agriculture, healthy living, and civic engagement for **more than 1,000 children**.

Just Girls Hearts of The Albemarle turned grants they received into scholarships for **42 girls' attendance** at the "Phenomenal Me on the Move Summer Program." This program encompassed activities and experiences that focused on media literacy, building positive relationships, budgeting, and other enrichment topics.

Together We Thrive!

Girl Scout Council of the Colonial Coast assisted **547 girls** with membership, camps, and programs to improve the health and well-being for girls.

Kids First delivered services to **over 200 children** who have experienced sexual assault, including medical evaluations, forensic interviews, three types of evidence-based therapy, and multi-disciplinary team (MDT) review of all cases. It also provided community-wide prevention training, victim/family advocacy, courtroom advocacy, and in-home therapy, all at no charge to the victim families.

Easing financial burdens for local families when tragedy strikes is the primary focus of **Outer Banks Relief Foundation.** It paid household bills, mortgage payments, automobile insurance, and loans with over **130 individuals** helped each year.

Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Raleigh

"Providing Hope for a Better Future"

Thanks to support from foundations, donors, and grants, the Catholic Charities Albemarle Regional Office helped **1,096 people** in 2024 through food and rental/utility assistance programs. Through the unwavering support of Catholic Charities, many in our community have rediscovered the strength to move forward with stability restored and hope renewed.



Pasquotank County 4-H provided educational experiences to youth through 4-H clubs, special interest clubs, summer camp, and school enrichment programs. Last year **over 2,500 youth** attended.

Donations through **Perquimans County 4-H** helped to equip **over 2,800 children** with supplies and scholarships for interactive camps, clubs, and learning opportunities.

Joseph Pilmoor Church Food Pantry, housed at Pilmoor Memorial United Methodist Church, provided **over 2,028 individuals** with much-needed food.

Scouting America – East Carolina Council, a positive youth development program, worked with local community service organizations (Boys & Girls clubs, churches, and civic groups) to provide a curriculum preparing approximately **75 boys and girls** for adulthood.

SPCA of Northeastern NC provided loving care for **1,719 animals** (1,214 cats and 505 dogs) using funds from the United Way for medical care, spay and neuter services, and vital vaccinations.

Scouting America – Tidewater Council provided extracurricular youth development programs for **over 500 boys and girls** ages 5-20 and their families. Its mission is to prepare young people to make ethical and moral choices over their lifetimes.

Over 4,000 registered athletes (the largest number in the country) participated in sporting activities due to the support of **Special Olympics**, **NC**.

YMCAs of the Albemarle, Currituck, and Outer Banks furnished scholarships for educational and enjoyable summer day camps for 299 low income and foster care youth in the region.

Community Care Collaborative



"Patty"



"Patty" experienced a stroke, which made it difficult to cover regular expenses and everyday necessities in addition to the medical bills. Facing such a situation, "Patty" was able to afford half of her February rent, but fell short on the remainder, putting her at risk of eviction through no fault of her own. CCC partnered with "Patty" to cover the remaining past due rent. She is now back to work and able to pay her full rent amount going forward. "Jason"



A single parent, "Jason" must cover all household expenses alone, including those for his child. After paying the security deposit and first month's rent to move into a new home, he fell behind on the next month's rent due to the unrealistic upfront costs required to secure suitable housing. CCC assisted with the rent payment to allow "Jason" and his child to remain in their new home.

"George"



With the long, cold weather this winter, many families faced extremely high electric bills. "George" paid his January bill, which was over \$800; however, when February's bill arrived, it was in excess of \$600 - more than his budget could handle. He turned to CCC for help. CCC paid the bill, easing "George's" fear of losing power for his family home and allowing his family to remain comfortable and warm knowing there are brighter days ahead.
